

The Library Network, Lakeland Library Cooperative and the Michigan Library Association are proud to announce that we have received \$2,252,462 through two grants from the Library of Michigan through the Institute for Museum and Library Services LSTA American Rescue Plan (ARPA). Public libraries in all 83 Michigan counties will soon be eligible for increased digital eContent from Overdrive, and technology tools and equipment (like laptops, Chromebooks, outdoor public address systems, etc.) to help facilitate recovery from the devastating economic and health effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Worthy of note: digital eContent will include topics on workforce development, job-seeking skills, health, mental health, and general educational needs. The project will also include a multi-media awareness campaign directed at library patrons to promote the availability of the increased content, and the technology available for loan and use in Michigan libraries. More information on these projects will be available later in November.

It is imperative that libraries **notify LM immediately** anytime there are updates or
cancellations to contracts or new library
service contracts are established. Library
State Aid funding and penal fine distributions
cannot be dispersed correctly by county
treasurers or LM unless we are aware of all
current contracted areas. If a contract is
canceled and LM is not notified the library
would be responsible for returning funds.

#### PENAL FINES

House Bill 4536 – diverts civil fines away from local libraries. Has passed the House. #### More Secretary of State self-service stations deployed across Michigan

OverDrive recently shared that changes are coming to the OverDrive Checkouts API. This change will provide users with clearer options for accessing titles they borrow from

your catalog. This update is required as we prepare to sunset the legacy OverDrive app next year. Without this update, current API download links would not work for users who don't already have the legacy app installed. OverDrive's API vendor partners are working to implement this update. OverDrive API partners are able to set these changes live from November 10, 2021 through January 12, 2022. Your catalog vendor can provide more details on when they will implement the changes for your library.

The change in the OPAC shouldn't affect the overall patron experience. When patrons check out the title, the dialogue box will have an extra option for the patron to download the title in Libby, or to download Libby to their device if it isn't already installed. It will make it easier for patrons to access the digital content after they've checked it out. You shouldn't need to do anything on the library side, the changes will be coordinated through your ILS vendor and our API Developers.
