### Public Library Services Grant Program

This program provides funding for **public libraries** to purchase materials and supplies that meet the selected program topics for a given year and are for an identified program or service the library will be providing. Funding is intended to supplement local topical services that improve information access and quality of service in their communities. The grant period is from mid-April to August. Funding will be from \$500 to \$2,000. Funding is by reimbursement. **The application deadline is March 6, 2020.** Eligible applicants are Michigan public libraries that are legally established and currently eligible for state aid.

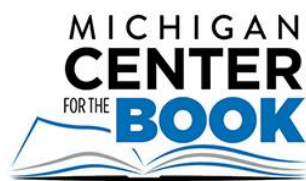

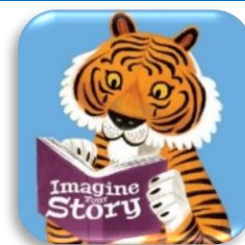

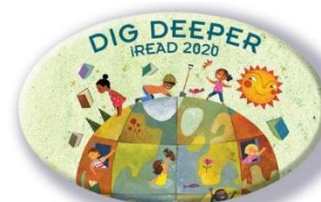

**Early Literacy Skills**

- Phonological awareness** – the ability to recognize and work with individual letters and sounds.
- Phonics** – connecting sounds with letters or groups of letters when learning to read.
- Alphabet** – reading words about correctly.
- Oral language** – using spoken words to express knowledge, thoughts, feelings, and wishes by speaking to others.
- Comprehension** – making text and understanding the meaning of words and sentences.
- Fluency** – ability to read with speed, accuracy, and proper expression.
- Reading comprehension** – recognizing the value of reading and the enjoyment of it.

Connecting seed libraries across Michigan

**How will Read by Grade Three affect my child?**

When children are strong readers they are better prepared to learn, participate and succeed in the classroom and beyond. In 2019, Michigan passed the Read by Grade Three Law. This law requires that by the end of 2020, Michigan public schools must ensure that all students are reading and demonstrating the skills of a third grader.

**How can I ensure these skills for my child to do the following:**

- Identify struggling readers early.
- Use the available support to read to your child.
- Access school resources through the school year.
- Provide reading with family-focused professional development.
- Provide parents with a Read at Home Plan that identifies ways to build capacity or support with reading at home.
- Provide more support to students at the end of the grade for an additional year so they can reach grade level by the end of the year.

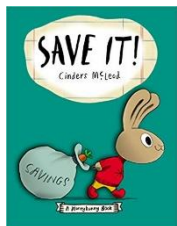
**Tips for Reading with Your Child**

- Start early! Read, sing, talk, write and play with your child before age 3. These practices from the First 1000 Days to 5 Year Program help develop early literacy skills in your young child from the very beginning. The more you talk with your library for a complete schedule to support these practices.
- Play around with books with your young child by reading, acting, singing, or dancing. Encourage your child to stretch and wiggle from the words.
- Read to your child in your first language. An adult who reads to you in your first language will help you understand the story.
- Make reading fun! Allow time for your child to read on their own, read to someone, and to read about their own lives. Remember that age that your child is best programming with an energy stage. That encourages your child to engage and learn best about.

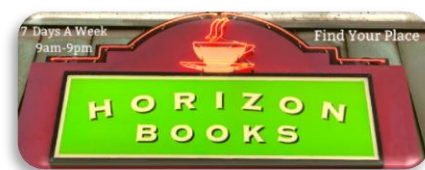

## 2020 Census FAQ

### What is the census?

The census is a count of every person who lives in the United States and its territories. It happens every 10 years. In early 2020, you will be asked to count everyone who lives in your home as of April 1. Responding to the 2020 Census is a chance to shape your future.

### What's in it for me?



Your responses inform where over \$675 billion is distributed each year to communities nationwide for clinics, schools, roads, and more.



Census data gives community leaders vital information to make decisions about building community centers, opening businesses, and planning for the future.



Responding also fulfills your civic duty because it's mandated by the U.S. Constitution. The United States has counted its population every 10 years since 1790.



Your responses are used to redraw legislative districts and determine the number of seats your state has in the U.S. House of Representatives.

### Is my information safe?

Your responses to the 2020 Census are safe, secure, and protected by federal law. Your answers can only be used to produce statistics. They cannot be used against you by any government agency or court in any way—not by the FBI, not by the CIA, not by the DHS, and not by ICE.

### When can I respond to the census?

In early 2020, every household in America will receive a notice to complete the census online, by phone, or by mail. In May, the U.S. Census Bureau will begin following up in person with households that have yet to respond.

### What will I be asked?

You will be asked a few simple questions, like age, sex, and the number of people who live in your home, including children.

### What won't be asked?

The census will never ask for Social Security numbers, bank or credit card numbers, money or donations, or anything related to political parties.
