



Member Happenings

• Glen Lake Community Library is within \$100,000 of the goal of \$1.758 million for the new building renovation. They will move to a temporary service location and develop a "boutique library" with a good variety of selected books and media, along with other essential services such as Internet access, reading nooks, and printing/fax/scanning services. Story hours, book discussion groups, and other programs will continue, but may take place off-site in different community venues. Some of the collection will go into storage but patrons will still be able to access needed materials through MeLCat.



 The Public Libraries in Oceana County have been working with the Huggard family to make old issues of the Oceana Herald Journal available to patrons wherever they access the Internet. After a year of planning the Shelby Area District Library. Hart Area Public Library. Hesperia Community Library and the Pentwater Township Library are ready to add past editions of the Oceana Herald Journal to their websites. Benzonia Public Library has been working with the U-M School of Information as a recipient of maker program assistance made possible by federal IMLS funding.





#### Library of Michigan LSTA **Grant Programs**

The Library of Michigan offers three different LSTA grant programs:

- Collaborative Library Services Grant Program - Large grants, with grant periods from one to three years (Oct.-Sept.) with funding amounts between \$50,000 and \$225,000 per year, up to a possible total of \$500,000. Funding availability and any change in program priorities will be announced in December for grants that begin October 1, 2019. If funding is available, an \*\*\* Intent to File form will be due January 31, 2019 and the application will be due May 31, 2019. \*\*\*
- Public Library Services Grant Program -Small grants for public library service, a summer quick grant funding supplies and materials for a specific program. Funding amounts are between \$500 and \$2,000 and projects must align to the topics and LSTA priorities specified. The application will reopen February 2019.

#### Big Opportunity for Small Libraries in 2019

The start of the New Year always brings a sense of opportunity, and this year WebJunction has a big opportunity for small libraries. We're expanding our Small Libraries Create Smart Spaces project, which is funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), making it available to 15 more small libraries. The selected libraries will collaborate with their communities to transform a space in their library to encourage more hands-on, participatory active learning. This is going to be fun!

During the first round of the project, 15 small public libraries serving rural or remote communities were chosen to participate. In addition to receiving funding support, participants attended webinars, received coaching from the WebJunction team, and were supported by fellow participants as they learned to transform cramped or underutilized spaces into vibrant, dynamic, active learning places.

Thanks to a generous supplemental grant from IMLS, WebJunction will help 15 more libraries infuse new life into their spaces. It's free to apply and free to participate. Selected libraries will receive \$5,000 for project materials, and will engage in online learning with the WebJunction team. Take a look at the incredible transformations from the first round of participants and how they created smart spaces in their libraries, and then learn more this new opportunity and apply soon! 
