- McBain Community Library had a good


turnout for a popular author of Amish novels, Beverly Lewis.





# **Grant Opportunities:**

## Library of Michigan LSTA Grant Programs

The Library of Michigan offers three different LSTA grant programs:

- Collaborative Library Services Grant Program - Large grants, with grant periods from one to three years (Oct.-Sept.) with funding amounts between \$50,000 and \$225,000 per year, up to a possible total of \$500,000. Funding availability and any change in program priorities will be announced in December for grants that begin October 1, 2019. If funding is available, an Intent to File form will be due January 31, 2019 and the application will be due May 31, 2019.
- Public Library Services Grant Program Small grants for public library service, a summer quick grant funding supplies and materials for a specific program. Funding amounts are between \$500 and \$2,000 and projects must align to the topics and LSTA priorities specified. The application will reopen February 2019.


