Public libraries may apply for grants to host public programs around the PBS series "The Great American Read," an eight-part television and online series designed to spark a national conversation about reading and the books that have inspired, moved, and shaped us, the ALA Public Programs Office announced. Read the full project guidelines and apply online by April 17. "The Great American Read" will premiere May 22 on PBS stations with a two-hour launch, kicking off a summer of reading and voting. In fall 2018, seven new episodes will air, featuring appearances by celebrities, athletes, experts, authors and everyday Americans advocating for their favorite book, culminating with a finale that reveals America's best-loved novel as chosen by the American public.

Open Grant Opportunity Encourages Community Development Approaches

Deadline for applications is May 14
The Institute of Museum and Library Services is accepting grant applications for Activating Community Opportunities Using Museums/Libraries as Assets now through May 14, 2018.

Museums, libraries, and archives, as well as universities and non-profit organizations with experience in museum, library, or archives projects and expertise in community development work, are eligible to apply. Award amounts will range from \$25,000 to \$150,000, and a one-to-one cost share is required. More details can be found in the application guidelines.




FACT: Only **8%** of Michigan Schools employ a full-time certified school librarian and only **18%** employ either a full or part-time school librarian.


FACT: Michigan ranks 47th in the nation in terms of the ratio of students to school librarians and ranks 46th in the nation in 4th-grade students scoring proficient or above in reading as measured by the National Assessment for Educational Progress (NAEP).





APRIL IS SCHOOL LIBRARY MONTH
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Congress has passed an FY2018 omnibus spending bill that includes significant federal funding increases for our nation's libraries. Good news for the rest of this fiscal year! But, the budget presented by the President for FY2019 eliminates the IMLS and federal funding for libraries (again)! Now that we are finished with the House, the "Dear Appropriator" letters have begun circulating in the Senate, asking Senators to preserve over \$210 million in federal library funding for FY 2019. One letter asks the Senate Appropriations Committee to fully fund the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) and the second asks for full funding for the Innovative Approaches to Literacy (IAL) program.

# Study shows worldwide lack of financial literacy



Adults need some basic financial skills in order to thrive in the world. but a study (Word file) conducted by Cambridge University and University College London found that many lack this knowledge. The situation is so bad, in fact, that the study authors are calling for policy intervention to improve financial literacy. The study analyzed data from a test that was administered in 2011 to more than 100,000 participants across 31 countries. The top performers were residents of Estonia, Finland, Japan, Singapore, and Austria. Least successful were adults in Turkey. Chile, Israel, Italy, Spain, and England....

#### Final Evaluation Findings


As part of the three-year grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, PLA hired ORS Impact to conduct ongoing evaluations of Project Outcome. These evaluations helped PLA identify user needs and make strategic and impactful improvements to the project. The final evaluation included an online participant survey and interviews with state library agencies and public libraries using outcome data.

Evidence collected throughout the project's three-year span suggests that Project Outcome has played a significant role in making outcome measurement "business as usual" for libraries and orienting libraries' planning, decision making, and accountability more toward patron and community impact.
