
MMLL Mini Grant Program

The American Library Association Legislative Day on the Hill in D.C. is an annual event that is very effective for library advocacy. ALA holds a training on site and prepares information for use with legislators. The Library of Michigan also prepares packets for each legislator as well as making appointments, so doing the work of visiting legislators (or their aids) is super easy, since all of the details are taken care of for you! It is an amazing learning experience, and I highly recommend it. The MMLL Board may approve the payment for at least one attendee, if we have the funds, and that should be decided at the January meeting. 
IMLS Presents New Strategic Plan for 2018-2022

- 4. **Achieve Excellence:** IMLS strategically aligns its resources and relationships to support libraries and museums nationwide.






#### Meet the 2018 ALA Policy Corps
