



New Director Workshop - September 14,



Advanced Director Workshop - September 15, 2017 This is a one-day event that will provide in-depth information on specific topics for new and experienced directors. Attendance at the workshops is necessary for director certification as part of the qualification criteria for state aid to public libraries. Current standards for state aid for public libraries require Classes 4 - 6 directors to complete the Advanced Directors Workshop within 2 years of initial appointment.

# **Grant Opportunities**

# LSTA Collaborative Library Services Grant Program 2017-2018 – This

multi-year grant program provides Michigan public, academic and school libraries the opportunity to develop innovative programs or services that have the potential to develop into sustainable regional or statewide programs that can benefit a broad range of libraries. Programs with strong partnerships between libraries, and/or local community groups or agencies have greater community support, so partnerships are a requirement for this grant. In a given fiscal year, the Library of Michigan will fund ONE to THREE pilot projects that meet these priorities.

#### **GRANT PRIORITIES:**

- Provide funding for innovative library services and programs,
- Create the opportunity to develop sustainable new regional or statewide programs, and
- Develop partnerships among libraries and/or between libraries and local community agencies.

Applicants may propose a library program or service in any content area appropriate for library services, such as the following:

- To develop an innovative service or program to meet a newly identified community need;
- To meet the increased community demand for a service or resource;
- To improve or develop new services to target populations, such as people from diverse geographic, cultural, and socioeconomic backgrounds; individuals with disabilities; and individuals with limited functional literacy, limited English proficiency or limited information literacy skills.

ALL applicants MUST submit an Intent to File form to be eligible to apply for a grant by October 31, 2017. Eligible libraries that submit the Intent to File form by the deadline are eligible to apply. The application is due January 31, 2018. See this <a href="Link">Link</a> for info.





A project of the American Library Association

ALA, in collaboration with the Center for News Literacy at Stony Brook University, invites public libraries to apply for Media Literacy @ Your Library, a pilot program that will train library workers to help their adult patrons become better news consumers.

In this six-month learning and prototyping project, ALA and the Center for News Literacy will work with teams from five public libraries to adapt existing media literacy training materials to serve the needs of public librarians and the communities they serve.

The cohort teams will attend an in-person training and use their skills to conduct related adult public programs in their communities. Team members will also provide feedback on the training and serve as advisers to, and beta testers for, the development of a corresponding web-based curriculum for the library field.

Read the <u>guidelines</u> for Media Literacy @ Your Library or <u>apply online</u> (<a href="https://apply.ala.org/medialiteracy">https://apply.ala.org/medialiteracy</a>) to be part of the cohort. Applications must be received by Sept. 11, 2017.

#### Selected libraries will receive:

- An intensive six-month experience that will include training and support for a three-person library team to develop and implement media literacy programming for adult patrons.
- \$1,500 for program-related expenses, such as travel, promotion and public programming costs.
- In-person media literacy workshop training, to be held on Thursday, Oct. 19, 2017, in Chicago.
- Two nights' hotel lodging and some meals at the in-person workshop for three library representatives. (Note that travel costs to Chicago are at the library's expense or must be paid from the \$1,500 stipend.)
- Communications support, access to a community of practice, and technical and programming support.

Media Literacy @ Your Library is supported by the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, the Democracy Fund and the Rita Allen Foundation. The project is administered by ALA's Public Programs Office.



#### Autism Welcome Here grants

The "Autism Welcome Here: Library Programs, Services and More" grant honors the work of Libraries and Autism: We're Connected cofounder Meg Kolaya for her contributions in promoting inclusion. Each year, a total of \$5,000 will be awarded. All types of libraries in the US or Canada are encouraged to apply. Proposals can fund projects and services directed to any age group. Applications will be accepted from September 1 through December 1.

# Science Kits for Public Libraries – GRANT Application Deadline: November 15, 2017

The IEEE Science Kits for Public Libraries Grant is offering up to \$2,000 in funding to public libraries in the Michigan and Wisconsin area for the development of circulating math and science collections for pre-university students (K-12). The grant seeks to be a catalyst for educating students about how math and science are used for the benefit of humanity and to provide seed money for creation of library programs that will make a lasting impression.

Past grants have allowed several Midwestern libraries to develop science kit circulating collections and give students access to prepared experiments and science materials that they might not encounter in the traditional classroom. Additionally, these libraries have created educational programs that allow students to conduct experiments at the library with the guidance of a librarian. This is a program of IEEE-Region 4 (Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers).


